THE LIGHT AND HAPPINESS OF CHRISTMAS

Dear everyone,

First let me say thank you for the warm welcome you have given to Denise and to me. There have been friendly visits, wood to burn on fires, guidance about how previous Christmases have been celebrated, invitations and proposals for Carol Singing. We heard the Choir sing Evensong at Chichester Cathedral beautifully. The Psalms are similarly chanted Sunday by Sunday. The flowers are lovely. And the Church is warm! We are much looking forward to being here.

What you have told me about the style of celebration of Withyham Christmases has reminded me of the Preface to a classic book of carols of over 80 years ago. Carols, we are told, are to be *simple*, *hilarious* and *popular*. It's the dimension of *hilarity*, says the Editor that has so often been forgotten. And by *hilarious* is meant not so much *funny*, as *boisterous*, *gladsome* and extremely cheerful or something of that sort. In fact the word *carol* is closely related to a word meaning *dance*.

The Preface goes on to regret that joyfulness was sometimes discarded by those who, as he puts it, were 'professionally afraid' of jollity. Simple and boisterous carols were hijacked by the earnest and well-meaning, and their words altered in order to get across a 'message'. But we should try, he says, to get behind all this and rediscover a more *relaxed* Faith, a spirit of a more spontaneous and undoubting Faith.

Could this Preface have been written today? An intriguing question. It is of course a cliché to say how 'commercialised' and 'secularised' Christmas has now become. Sad to say, it has. And this unfortunately gives the impression that there are really *two* Christmases: the 'religious' Christmas, and the 'everything else' Christmas.

Now, for each of us, this year will have brought its joys and sorrows. At Christmas, however, *Joy and dancing* and *seriousness* do not represent opposite moods. English religion over four centuries has often thought they were. But, says the author, *to take life with real seriousness is only sad when it is superficial... The carol is nearer to the ultimate truth because it is jolly...*

Eighty years on, we have gone still further down the road of separating joy from seriousness. It is nowadays even harder for most of us to connect Christmas partying with the 'religious' meaning of Christmas. We just do see them as different worlds. We go to church, perhaps, but we may think it is only after church that the 'real' festivities can begin.

Well, to put all this into reverse might seem as difficult as reversing the incoming tide. And yet each time we say 'Happy Christmas', we can do just that. Because whenever we say it, we shall mean two things: 'Have good parties', yes, but also, 'Because of Christmas, peace and goodwill to you... Let it be true that, one day, all manner of things shall be well!'

The shopping, the parties, the churchgoing are part of one and the same thing: the visitation of the darkness of our present world by the Light of the Eternal Word.

In this spirit, let me wish you a very happy and blessed Christmas.





WITHYHAM HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY December

After our annual AGM Helen Clark (our previous Treasurer) is now your Chairwoman, and Simon Costen has agreed to take over as Treasurer. For this we are all very grateful. We also welcome two new committee members Miriam Boobier and Gill Bath. Please note that we are seriously short of men on the committee as they are invaluable in helping set up for the shows, so if anyone would like to volunteer we would be grateful. The AGM went off very smoothly our thanks go to Anne Barker who took the chair, and also Bill Sanford who was yet again out in the cold organising the parking for us. After the official business we had drinks and snacks and then had a wonderful hour with our panel of three local gardeners who were unfailing in there knowledgeable assistance with the very many and various questions that were asked. We all had a most enjoyable evening. The committee will now spend some time in organising yet another great year for our members

Gardening tips for December are:

- 1. Clear away old crops from your vegetable garden and dig in bulky organic matter such as garden compost or well-rotted farmyard manure. Should you be troubled by a clay soil, cover with polythene to keep the rain off and this will make it easier to dig.
- 2. Leave the last flower heads on your hydrangeas over winter as they provide important frost protection to the new buds developing further down the stem. You can cut them off once the weather improves next spring.
- 3. Continue to remove fallen leaves especially the ones which fall on smaller plants such as alpines, and don't forget the ones around the base of roses that carry blackspot or disease, these should be destroyed if possible and not put into your compost.
- 4. Brighten up the house with a new flowering houseplant such as cyclamen which need good light and cool conditions they hate hot stuffy or dark rooms, do not overwater, or azalea which appreciate a cool, well-lit position, keep the compost moist and water every few days preferable with rainwater, and of course lovely poinsettias, which thrive in warm light conditions away from cold draughts. Water when leaves wilt very slightly by giving the compost a good soak and then allow to drain.

Artist of the Month - Rogier van der Weyden 1399/1400-1464


Van der Weyden also known as Roger de le Pasture was born in the French speaking town of Tournai in Belgium. Son of Henri de le Pasture and Agnes de Watrelos, he became known as one of the three most notable early flemish painters, together with Jan van Eyck and Robert Campin.

He remains something of a mystery. But he was internationally successful during his lifetime, having copies of his paintings exported to France, Germany, Spain and even Italy, and his reputation spread deep into Europe. He never signed any of his work, which obviously makes it difficult to attribute work to him with certainty and he left no self-portraits. There are some who dispute that even some of his most famous paintings such as The Descent from the Cross belong to him. By the late 17th century most of his works had been destroyed by the French bombardment of Brussels in 1695. The paintings that do survive are either portraits or religious scenes.

He had a reputation for amazing detail and technical ability and tended to work with life models. Facial expressions were typically detailed (an example of this is Nicodemus' stubble in The Descent from the Cross) although not always totally accurate. He pandered to his commissioned sitters, flattering them in his portrayals, whether or not deserved. Erwin Panofsky, the German art historian said "Rogier felt and expressed emotions and sensations-mostly of a bitter or bittersweet nature-that no painter had ever recaptured".

Robert Campin was his teacher to whom he was apprenticed in 1427. By 1432 Rogier had gained the status of an independent master, settling in Brussels, where he spent most of his life. By 1436 he had become the city painter running a large workshop with his son. Even though he held no position in the Burgundian court he did produce works for the Duke of Burgundy, Philip the Good.

Following his death, his name faded from view mainly due to changes in tastes but interest began to rekindle in the 19th century. By the 20th century his reputation as a leading 15th century Flemish painter was reborn.



The Middelburg Altarpiece c1445-1448

This scene depicts the Nativity and is the central panel of a Triptych (a set of three pictures or panels which are hinged together). It is now housed in the Staatliche Museum in Berlin. Baltic oak was used as panels. Nativity scenes tended to contain Mary, the newborn Jesus, Joseph and sometimes angels (who were usually depicted as musicians). In this depiction however the male figure dressed in black is wearing clothes more akin to the fashions of the Duke of Burgundy and a member of the upper classes.

WITHYHAM PARISH COUNCIL (WPC) November 2013

To find out about **WPC** activities you can access information via our website or on Facebook (*see the back cover of the magazine*). You can also request Minutes of meetings from the Clerks at the Old Station, Groombridge.

HARRISON ROCKS: A Coup for WPC! As reported previously the Harrison Rocks facility might have been shut down. WPC called a meeting of the main stakeholders at which Sport England acknowledged that it had not been aware of the impact that the closure would have, and agreed to make the necessary repairs to the toilet block so that it may be reopened in the New Year. This will enable the camp site to open as well. They will also repair the car park. WPC has offered to assist the Forestry Commission in seeking a suitable tenant from November 2014. WPC propose to call an Open Meeting to seek the views of residents so that these can be fed into the survey that the Forestry Commission will be conducting.

WEALDEN DISTRICT COUNCILLOR (WDC): Are you still having difficulties in getting your bins emptied? Around 2% of properties are still being missed because the new vehicles cannot get up narrow tracks or because the staff are unfamiliar with the routes. Please inform the WPC clerk if this is happening to you, and she will advise WDC. Last month WDC undertook its annual electric blanket check and of the 248 tested, 101 (40%) were found to be dangerous. Have you had yours checked recently? Contact the WPC clerk for details of the next testing.

POLICE AND NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH: Please be vigilant in securing your house and outbuildings when you go out. There have been a spate of burglaries and break-ins in the St John's area and it is possible the perpetrators will be moving on to other parts of the parish. Leave lights and radios on and shut all windows. If you would like items security marked, please ring 07787 685737 or 101.

WARD REPORTS

St John's Ward: The new shared noticeboard at St John's Church has now been installed. WPC are now fully involved in the new burial ground which it is proposed to build in the field next to the Forest Fold Baptist Chapel. Residents are concerned, among other things, about the speed of the traffic on that stretch of road, the possible run-off from that land and the impact of the two planned buildings on an AONB

Withyham/Blackham Ward: WPC will be studying quotations for the replacement of a bench at Balls Green/Station Road corner, which has been irreparably damaged. The A264 footpath petition should be discussed at the next WDC meeting.

PARISH OFFICE: WPC wish to ensure that the Parish Office pays for itself. They are, therefore, advertising their Meeting Room for firms looking for a Training Day venue. Please pass this on to those who may be interested. There will be special rates for residents!

WPC with the SVR will be holding a joint Open day on April 26th 2014.



Letter from the Trenches from my Grandfather to his mother between 1915 and 1917. He married my Granny after the war. Granny was a senior sister at St Georges Hospital, Hyde Park. They met after he had been casevacked to recover from shrapnel wounds. He was then sent back to the front line. They married in 1919 in Houlton, Maine. Thanks to Joe Putnam and his trust in God, there are 14 direct descendants who have been brought up or live around Hartfield and Withyham.



My Dear Mother,

Just a few lines to let you know that I am in the best of health and as I heard that you were sich around the 1st of June and I sincerely hope that you have recovered your health back by this time. I have received a lot of mail since the 1st of June but as we were at it hammer and tongs for the last three weeks I have had no time to write. I shall make up for the lost time this week as we are out for a rest and believe me we certainly needed one. The fighting has been something fierce along our line but we are still (blanked out). Expect we shall see more until peace is declared which we are looking forward for soon. A battle is something to go through namely when it lasts more than one day. The last one raged for about ten days. They say that it was the fiercest bombardment as yet seen on our front. I would much rather be in an earthquake.

Those blasts which we set off for the enemy were nothing compared with the bursting of a big shell and when they are coming about ten a minute there is

no chance to ran and hide. If one rans from one shell one is very likely to bamp into another so the only thing to do is to hag mother earth and trast in God.

One has queer feelings when undergoing the first shell fire. But we all know what we are here for and just keep our eyes open watching for fritz. There is not much hand to hand fighting as both sides are very well entrenched and it takes heavy shell fire to knock the trenches to pieces. Our artillery pounded fritz in good shape last week and we took fifteen yards of his trenches.

We cannot depend on the weather as when there is a heavy bombardment the weather is always disagreeable. We are having great times now that we are oat of the trenches and talking over oar narrow escapes. To be buried ander or lifted clear of the ground is nothing after it has happened.

I expect that you are out to the lake now and having a good time. I shall make up for lost time when I get back. I am so used to living in the trenches that I'll have to get permission from the water Company to sleep in their pipe ditches when I get home. One does not have a chance to look around in the day time or in the trench line, therefore life is something like that of a rat. We have quite a few rats here too. They don't seem to mind the shell fire as we do. I was very near shell shocked this last trip. Shellshock pats a chap's nerves on the burn. You lay in your trench shiverina and shakina all over. You notice some ok the bows shakina all over when they come out of the cold water

shivering and shaking all over. You notice some of the boys shaking all over when they come out of the cold water after swimming a long time. Well, shell shock is the same only about fifty times stronger. One is not afraid but you cannot help shaking. It wears off after being under fire once or twice.

I must close now as it is time for dinner. I send my love to you all.


